General Caution against Ostentation in Religious Duties (Matthew 6:1). 1. Take heed that ye do not your alms—But the true reading seems clearly to be "your righteousness." The external authority for both readings is pretty nearly equal; but internal evidence is decidedly in favor of "righteousness."

In Jesus' exposition on prayer, in Matthew 6:5-15, Jesus teaches His disciples using two object lessons: the poor motivation of some Jews; and the ignorant and useless prayers of the Gentiles. Further, within the context of the Lord's prayer (vv. 9-13), Jesus taught His followers that prayer is an opportunity to strengthen and deepen one's relationship with God (vv. 6, 9, 11).
